so that they may come to personal faith in our Lord Jesus Christ, grow in Christian maturity and become both committed church members and servants of a world in need.



What SU Camps mean to Josh

Josh came to Australia from India when he was 12 to attend his first SU Grade 4-6 Camp at Camp Coolamatong. From that moment he was hooked.

"I came back every summer to attend a holiday camp at Coola. I loved the environment, the other campers, and the leaders. Every year I would return it felt like we picked up right where we left off.

"I loved the deep chats, and not having to worry about what anyone else was thinking about me. I was able to come out of my shell and be myself, and grow so much stronger in my relationship with God.," he says.

Last year Josh returned to lead on for the first time and is keen to do it again this year!.

"I loved being able to give the kids the kind of experience I had at camp. I listened and also shared my story with them, which I hope helps them as they go through their own challenges.

Josh's experience with SU Camps has also inspired him to volunteer as an intern at Coola, learning all the practical skills that go into running a camp.

"Camps have always been milestones for me, always the biggest reinforcement for my faith. Being an intern at Coola will be fulfilling for me, in every way."

Beach 2 Bush

Beach2Bush is a community outreach run by SU in partnership with Nambour Baptist Church, which takes young people in grades 10, 11 and 12 from the Sunshine Coast to small and rural state schools to share the meaning of Christmas through creative arts of puppets, drama and song. Many of those small rural schools rarely get outside visitors to come into their schools, and the students that go from the coast are often blown away by the size and remoteness of the schools we visit. Principals have welcomed us with open arms, and last Christmas was no different, particularly when they see the enthusiasm of our students and how their own students welcome the message we present.

Now operating for 27 years and travelling to approximately 150 different schools throughout Queensland, the reason for the season still continues to inspire young people to make a difference in other people's lives.

Teen adds new layers of faith at camp

"My child came back [from camp] very encouraged in his faith. He finds it difficult to be only one of the few Christian teens in our town and church. It was eye-opening to him to realise that his negative experiences are not so much about church, but tied to the lack of peers to do it with. He also said he had a lot of prayers answered on camp. He said that each year at camp he has a new layer added to his faith. We are so appreciative of all the leaders who pour so much time and love into camp and the kids. Thank you!

SU Schoolies & Leavers

Churches see attendance boost after SU-Schoolies

SU-Schoolies returned to the Whitsundays and Sunny Coast in 2021 giving Year 12 graduates from Cairns to the Gold Coast, and as far west as Chinchilla the chance to celebrate. We were once again excited to not only see the impact that God had on Schoolies with many committing to serve God in their local communities, but we also heard from local churches about the influx of attendees at services in the weeks after the event!

For one young school leaver, Hyemin, Schoolies had a profound impact on her, helping re-connect her with her faith.

"Through COVID and everything happening this year, I wasn't thinking about God a lot. But [at SU-Schoolies] I got that feeling back. I felt overwhelmed and happy. He reminded me that he has a plan and he's still there [for me]," she says.





Graduate discovers Jesus at Leavers

SU Leavers gives high-school graduates the opportunity to celebrate the end of their schooling lives in a fun, positive environment, while learning more about Jesus. Its popularity has been growing in Western Australia over the years, so much so that we had an additional 46 campers with us in Kalbarri in 2021. On the final night of camp, the Holy Spirit moved and five young people gave their life to Christ, including a former atheist. This is his testimony

"I was born into an atheist household. I came to the SU Leavers camp expecting to only be in it for the adventure camp sections, but in the first RealTalk session, something spoke to me. By the end of the week, I gave myself over to God and when the leaders were praying for me, I just started crying uncontrollably as I felt the presence of God and put my faith in Him. To top off this whole amazing, life-changing experience, with such wonderful, supporting people, a leader came to me and invited me to his church, which is everything I wanted from a church to join and just happens to be 500 metres from my house."

Mannum SUPA Summa Fun

"A man's heart plans his way. But the Lord directs his steps." Proverbs 16:9.

With COVID still a reality in the early part of this year, this verse rings true after what we experienced with Mannum SUPA Summa Fun (SSF). As a team we made plans, knowing that at any stage the Team Leaders could announce it wasn't safe for Mission to happen. SSF was planned as a four day morning event, Monday to Thursday, run outside on the MaryAnn Reserve next to the Murray river.

On Wednesday our theme was God welcomes everyone. Seventeen children and adults joined in, many for the first time, excited to see what was on offer in the various gazebos.

Children were engaged with their activities, adults were engaged in conversation with team members and each other.

It was a blessing to serve as a united team and show the love of Jesus. We all felt a great sense of joy and deep satisfaction after handing out bibles and resources and engaging in conversations.

Thursday morning brought different news. One of our team had tested COVID positive and the program was cancelled. And so our best day became our last day. We trust God with the seeds that were sown, knowing that he indeed directs our steps.

Marie's transformation at Stanley beach mission

SU Beach Missions are not just events that happen over the school holidays. Each mission is a living community that shines God's love to people from all backgrounds as they discover life and purpose in his big story.

For Marie^{*} and her daughter, SU's Stanley Beach Mission in north-western Tasmania has had a life-transforming impact.

Marie had been banned from a number of local shops and the caravan park due to her ice addiction and difficulty in controlling her emotions.

Working with the caravan park to get their permission, and following Jesus' own example, the team welcomed Marie and her daughter. They became regulars throughout the week, chatting with the team and joining the activities, Stanley Beach Mission Director, Krissy says. "We had a supporter donate a bible with a special request attached – that it goes to 'someone special'. When our team gathered for our final devotion of the week, we unanimously voted that it would go to Marie," Krissy recalls.

This was two years ago... Today, Marie has turned her life around, and both she and her daughter continue to attend Stanley Beach Mission every year. Not only that, but Marie is now also in a healthy relationship and has just given birth to a baby boy.

We're looking forward to catching Marie and her beautiful family at next year's Stanley Beach Mission.

Our Ministries

School Chaplaincy

SU Australia and Generate chaplains provide social, spiritual and emotional support to school communities. They are in the prevention and support business: helping students find a better way to deal with issues ranging from family breakdown and loneliness to friendships and mental health.

They provide a listening ear and a caring presence for children and young people in crisis, and those who just need a friend. They also provide support for staff and parents in school communities.

In the 2021/22 financial year, 706 SU and Generate chaplains faithfully served and supported 1,014 school communities across Australia.

We also inducted 134 new chaplains across the nation.

Josh's call to serve in Cowboy Country

SU and Generate chaplains are called to serve in many places of need, from primary and high schools to special schools, hospitals, universities.

For school chaplain Josh Lane, he is now supporting students at a boarding facility set up by the National Rugby League's (NRL) North Queensland Cowboys, through the Cowboys Community Foundation.

NRL Cowboys House provides safe, supported accommodation for young Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students from remote communities, enabling them to access quality secondary education opportunities in Townsville.

For Josh, who is also Indigenous, it marks a return to chaplaincy, having previously served from 2007 to 2017. Late last year, Josh felt God was calling him back.

"I saw a real need in Townsville. There's a crisis happening up here with the young people in our community, and I felt a tug from God to get back into this work again," Josh says. At NRL Cowboys House, Josh supports students facing the challenges of homesickness, while also providing life coaching and spiritual guidance.

"Spirituality is the number one thing I talk to kids about at the House," Josh says.

"Culturally, spirituality is very real [for many Indigenous students and their families]. They come to me with questions and issues. I encourage and help them understand the issues they are facing."

Leigh Allender, Director of Boarding at NRL Cowboys House, values the vital role Josh plays.

"Josh works closely with our psychologists and wellbeing team – he's built some really strong relationships with the students," Leigh says.

"He's a big part of our social and emotional wellbeing program for Year 7 and 8 students. Since his arrival he's made a real difference."



Our Ministries CHAPLAINCY

Chaplain and church connect for family in need

Two weeks before the end of the 2021 school year Melbourne-based Altona College school chaplain Shyamala, heard some troubling news from a student she was working with.

The student, his mum and siblings had been forced to flee their home after an 'incident'.

"He was displaying some inappropriate behaviour at school," Shyamala recalls. "He was reenacting things he'd seen at home. He's very young, and sounded traumatised."

His teacher asked Shyamala to work with him.

"He said he'd written a letter to Santa, asking for nappies, cash, and some toys. I asked what the nappies were for and he explained 'Mum says we didn't have any money for [Christmas] presents this year because nappies are so expensive."

The family had been roughing it since leaving home, and

the young boy had recently missed his birthday, which prompted Shyamala into action.

"I called one of the local churches [St Eanswythe's] and I told the vicar the needs of this family and he immediately said, 'Yes, we'll help'."

That Sunday, the vicar shared the family's story with his congregation, and they responded with three huge bags of wrapped gifts, a box of nappies, a Christmas hamper, baby clothes, and over \$100 of gift cards.

When Shyamala delivered the gifts, the mum burst into tears.

"The pastor had written a note to say, 'This is not from me, this came from the people of this church, who I've not met, and you've not met, but they knew they had to do this for you."

Special Religious Education (SRE) & RELIGIOUS INSTRUCTION (RI)

SU Australia and Generate are committed to giving young people opportunities to explore their faith in a welcoming and safe environment. As part of our ongoing work in this area we deliver Special Religious Education (SRE) and Religious Instruction (RI) in New South Wales and Northern Territory schools.

The lingering effects of the pandemic significantly impacted SRE and RI programs in 2021/22. This was most felt in 2021 with many classes cancelled because of COVID restrictions. 2022 has thankfully brought clearer waters in this regard and SRE teachers/RI instructors are once again able to share God's good news to students whose families have chosen to enrol them in these programs.

Matthew Bottin, a Generate SRE teacher who commenced his role at a high school on New South Wales' North Coast in Term 2 has seen a steady increase in Year 7 students attending SRE classes after a two-and-a-half year hiatus. He has been encouraged by their high level of engagement and the lively discussions.



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"For my part it has been fun playing icebreaker games while sharing biblical truths. But the real highlight for me has been all the great questions our students are asking,"

In New South Wales more than 22,000 students accessed SRE classes facilitated by 114 Generate SRE teachers. Our teachers were supported by 229 volunteers.

In the Northern Territory 534 students accessed RI classes across nine schools in the greater Darwin area. Our three SU Australia RI staff were supported by 16 volunteers.



Special Religious Education (SRE) & RELIGIOUS INSTRUCTION (RI)



More than a decade ago, Aimee's life changed forever thanks to high school SRE, previously known as Scripture.

Now a store manager at Koorong in Newcastle, Aimee credits her faith today to her high school scripture classes where she first read the Bible for herself and encountered the transforming love of Jesus.

"I wasn't raised in a religious household; I knew who Jesus and God were and knew some of the stories but I really didn't know how to connect... My faith journey started slowly with attending scripture at school and I began to read the Bible," recalls Aimee.


"My faith grew and I felt like my search for purpose was coming to an end."

"I see the (SRE) classes as a form of education in schools. It's part history and geography, part science and part life skills. It teaches kids about loving others just as God loves us."

Aimee recalls her SRE classes being highly interactive, and a safe, non-judgemental space to learn about the Bible and the Christian faith.

Her teacher was relatable, making classes enjoyable as they explored together, and he encouraged the students to ask questions and participate in discussions.

"Scripture classes were the foundation of my faith, and I believe that scripture is vital in the (NSW) public school system. Scripture classes were invaluable for me and paved the way for who I am today," said Aimee.

Earlier this year we learned from the 2021 Census that Australia is now a "majority migrant nation", with 51.5% of our population either born overseas or having a parent who was born overseas. This cultural richness presents SU Australia with challenges and opportunities, as we pursue our vision to reach every Australian child, young person and family.

The aim of SU's cultural ministry is to serve the movement and local churches with resources, training and perspective on cultural identity and engagement. Our desire is to see the whole body of Christ, "from every nation, tribe, people and language" (Rev 7:9), united in love and growing in ministry impact.

A centrepiece of our work is CHAT, which stands for Cultural Hearing Asking Telling, and provides a framework for cultural interactions, and tools for use in formal contexts like schools and informally on camps or holiday programs. This year we have provided CHAT Training in Brisbane, Sydney, Melbourne, Adelaide and Perth, with more inner-city and country locations under development. To find out more, visit chatproject.org.au

At the end of 2021 we secured funding to develop camps or holiday programs to actively engage cultural groups not normally reached by SU ministry. Foundations are now being laid and we look forward to sharing all the new missional expressions in the pipeline.



Cross-Cultural

Inspired and renewed by God's love

In June we were invited by a Chinese Church to help them think more deeply about cultural engagement and what Jesus taught about loving our neighbour. A feature of the training is to engage with another group of people to better understand them.

We took the group to a mosque, which is led by the local Bosnian community.

As members from both groups engaged one another they learned about the layers upon layers of differences. Through this learning and engagement the Christian leaders walked away feeling surprised and inspired afresh at the radical nature of God's love for us and for the whole world.



SU Institute of TRAINING

SU Institute of Training (RTO 30548) delivers nationally recognised qualifications in Youth Work.

Our programs have been developed in line with industry standards, with a particular focus on developing a Christian framework for the practice of youth work in community, school or church contexts. We offer Certificate and Diploma level qualifications in Youth Work, Chaplaincy, and Pastoral Care as well as the 2 minimum chaplaincy units.

Frontline children and youth workers require up-to-date information, skills and tools to minister effectively to young Australians. SU Equip blends industry best-practice standards with on-the-ground experience to deliver relevant and engaging training and resources. SU Equip partners with the SU Australia field teams to ensure the ongoing currency of all frontline staff and volunteers.

Schools Ministry Conferrence

Our first ever SU Australia and Generate Schools Ministry Conference was a highlight for the more than 700 chaplains and SRE teachers who attended. "I loved the speakers; they were all dynamic and the content was excellent. It was also great to meet many new faces and hear the stories behind the work we all do."

"I loved being with other people who are passionate about ministry to kids in schools, I have felt a little isolated over the last number of years (possibly due to covid and limited opportunities to meet up and no annual conference for the last couple of years), so it was refreshing to remember that we are part of something bigger and see other faces and people and spend time together."

"I loved the large range of workshops we could pick from to go to each day. I found it easy to find a workshop that suited the things that God was working on in my personal growth."



AMPLIFY CONFERENCE

AMPLIFY-ing Training Across the Country.

The annual Brisbane-based AMPLIFY conference (formerly known as IGNITE) was a well-attended and growing feature in many churches' training calendar for 16 years ... until the pandemic.

In 2020, God birthed a new vision for this conference – a decentralised model that equipped and empowered 'Hubs' in local communities across the country to host their own AMPLIFY day, while our central leadership team provided digital keynote messages and interactive electives.

In 2022, 36 Hubs in six states registered their events with an estimated 1500 leaders in children, youth and families ministry gathering at local venues and online. AMPLIFY also facilitates an annual leadership summit for ministry team leaders. AMPLIFY continues to be a partnering initiative, 'owned' and supported by churches working together. SU Australia is investing time and resources through website support, registration systems, insurance cover, accounting support, sponsorship arrangements, marketing strategies and more.

AMPLIFY is a significant strategy for SU Australia as it prioritises its "working with the churches" in accordance with our SU Aims.



Our CAMPSITES

Update from Coolamatong (VIC)

For the start of this report period (July-December 2021), Victoria was in the midst of lockdowns, which meant Coolamatong was a campsite without any campers.

Our teams used this period to invest in our interns, make improvements to the site, and ready ourselves for the future.

In Term 4 school camping resumed. With schools eager for their students to have a positive camp experience after a tough two years, we enjoyed a full Term 4 with many campers enjoying a life-giving time. On the flip side, our staff and supporter team were impacted by vaccination mandates.

Our Summer Camp program was positive, particularly with the re-introduction of a Year 11, 12, and young adults camp. We look forward to continued growth as we rebuild after summers affected by bushfires and Covid.

In the first half of 2022 we welcomed a new team of interns. As Covid restrictions continued to wind down, we gradually returned to "close-to-normal" operations. The story of 2022 so far has been one of more campers experiencing the love of Jesus as they spent time as part of the Coola family in Victoria.





Update from Camp Geographe (WA)

The highlight of our previous 12 months has been the ablution block improvement. The smart new walls and floors have improved the layout and the look of the facility.

Our season of busyness at Camp Geographe extended into winter, increasing all-year-round use of the site, which increases the ministry opportunities. SU camps are increasing, as are non-SU camps. Not all are ministry based, but a recent guest spoke about the annual school camp that he runs saying "the minute I set foot here I get choked up and feel so emotional because year after year our students make significant life decisions here that change the direction of their life." At the end of camp, he shared "this was another wonderful experience where God moved and showed himself to us throughout the week."

CHILDSAFE AUSTRALIA

Making Australia ChildSafe

The last year for ChildSafe Australia has been a huge one. First and foremost, we have created ChildSafe Environments for over 325,000 children. This is the statistic that really matters as it helps us to see the difference we are making for children in organisations around Australia.

We have continued to grow our influence in the Local Government, sporting clubs, child care/kinder, and church sectors seeing a high demand for child safety training to educate the organisation's staff and volunteers. To meet this growing need, we have developed new training, including a new online child safety training for all adults around Australia.

With the introduction of the new 11 Victoria Child Safe Standards, we ran 11 webinars for multiple organisations from various sectors. This proved to be a supportive resource for many and the sector experts we had, provided valuable insight.

We also launched our ongoing campaign #speakupfor4kids aimed at empowering adults, children, and organisations on how to speak up for children when it comes to child safety.

Our Financial Position

The Group's accounting period is the year ended 30 June 2022. The comparative 2021 accounting period (used in our statutory accounts) is from 1 January 2021 to 30 June 2021 as a result of a change in financial year-end post-merger. That makes year-on-year comparisons difficult this year so, in this annual report, we have used unaudited management accounts for the 12 months to 30 June 2021 for the sake of comparison (*the same management figures we provided in the annual report last year*).

This is an example of the complexity we are progressively eliminating in the period since we merged nine entities (on 1 June 2021) to form SU Australia. Another complexity this year is that on 1 October 2021, Scripture Union Service Ltd aquired 100% of the membership interests of Generate Services Limited ("Generate"). The 2022 consolidated accounts therefore include only nine months' financial performance (1 October 2021 to 30 June 2022) for Generate.




Figure 1. Timeline of SU Australia Merger

FINANCE RESULTS

Key Financial Observations

 The group's total equity remained relatively stable from 2021 to 2022 at \$40.324M (2021 \$38.822M), including a \$3.3M net assets gain during the financial period, due to SU Australia acquiring 100% of the membership interests of Generate.

2. Except for Generate (which only included 9 months of performance), the year ending 30 June 2022 was the first full year the SU Australia entities operated as a consolidated group. The consolidated financial result for that period (including Generate) is an overall loss of -\$2.682M.

This result included \$1.484M of one-off merger-related costs incurred to bring people, systems and processes together.

This has included work to bring together our separate finance systems as well as new ministry supporting systems and infrastructure, such as a new camping participants and booking system, event management systems, volunteer management systems and risk management systems. When we have completed this work we hope to see our ministries across Australia well supported and our volunteers and staff enabled in their work.


During this period there were significant effects on operations from pandemic-related lockdowns and slow downs. That included an approximate \$0.648M (8.7%) reduction in income from impacted programs (including camps, chaplaincies, camp site bookings and Special Religious Education (SRE) teaching). With the impacts of the pandemic on our ministries reducing in the second half of 2022, we hope to report on positive increases in ministries (and related revenues) in our annual report next year. **3.** In the previous period ending 30 June 2021, the group aggregated result (excluding Generate) was a surplus of \$13.9M largely due to Government wage subsidies, one-off donation amounts, and other abnormal outcomes during the pandemic and post-merger period that we could not treat as 'business as usual' (BAU). We reported last year, with those non-BAU and abnormal outcomes stripped out, that the 30 June 2021 underlying operational outcome was a group operating deficit of -\$1.062M.

If we strip out the non-BAU items and normalise the financial results for 30 June 2022 in the same way, including removing fully funded chaplaincy spending, the underlying group operating result for the period to 30 June 2022 is a \$1.197M surplus.

However, we had planned to incur more expenses than were actually incurred during the year (some being non-BAU expenses to complete our post-merger transformation), and we carried some vacancies which would have added additional expenses if filled.

4. Last year we reported we had found more than 5% of budgeted savings compared with the inherited pre-merger budget position.

In a high inflationary environment and with other economic uncertainties, we must continue to maintain a disciplined approach to expenses in the period to 30 June 2023. Also, the management team is also doing all we can to substantially complete all non-BAU transformation during 2023, so that we can reduce that source of abnormal expense into the future.



Our FUTURE INITIATIVES

Our SU Australia vision is a big, ambitious vision and one worth striving for!

"Every child, young person and family in Australia [having] opportunities of transforming experiences with Jesus and a lifelong journey of discipleship and serving a world in need."

As a national movement, we are already at work seeing our vision realised in communities across Australia, however, we are only reaching around 10% of children, young people and families.

We believe that, together, we can co-create a future where our vision is audacious, but also possible and sustainable.

'When you see the ark of the covenant of the Lord your God ... move out from your positions and follow it. Then you will know which way to go, since you have never been this way before.' [Joshua 3:3&4 NIV]

SU Australia came from a sense that we could be stronger together as a unified national movement. Before we formed SU Australia, we had glimpses of what that could look like, but we needed to 'get across the river' into our new SU Australia space to form a better picture of the possibilities.

The SU leadership team is currently seeking God, getting some height, 'seeing the land', and turning our eyes to where we need to go next to reach more children and young people across Australia.

We've already seen some initiatives beginning to take shape to birth new ministry:

- Online children's ministry training for volunteers in the ACT, and for churches spread across the nation
- The launch of SQUAD, a new camp for secondary school girls in South Australia
- Lego Club in George Town and Swansea Holiday Club in Tasmania
- New chaplaincy services at Mansfield Autism Statewide Service and Dookie Autism College in Victoria.
- GENTS Fathers & Sons Camp expanding from SA to NSW, to be run in partnership with Generate
- Inspire Art Camp, also in NSW

We are also exploring other future initiatives, including these three:

- Expanding our Cross Cultural and First Nations work.
 14% of young Australians come from a migrant or first nations background, and we want to build new ways to engage, learn, partner and work together with churches, families and communities in this space
- Strengthening our training for mission. We have a strong heritage of developing leaders for ministry and we want to see that become even stronger. We have re-launched our registered training organisation as SU Institute of Training (SUIT), and we are working to strengthen our training offerings to SUIT students and leaders of SU ministries.
- Supporting Christians in Schools. We already have some support networks for Christian teachers and people working in community contexts. We are exploring how to expand this into an integrated national program under the banner of 'Trellis'. A trellis is a lightweight structure that supports a vine to allow it to reach out and carry more fruit. So, we're exploring how SU Australia can provide support for others' fruitful work.



Our FUTURE INITIATIVES

These are just some of the new projects we have in the pipeline. We look forward to updating you further in the coming months.
